North America is the third largest continent. It covers 24.71 million km². The countries of North America include Canada, the United States and Mexico. It is in the western hemisphere and is generally referred to as the New World or the Americas. The Missouri river is the longest in North America, with the Mississippi river being the second longest. The biomes of North America are vastly different because of the size of the continent.



The flag of Canada. The capital of Canada is Ottawa. The maple leaf represents the cultural heritage and natural resources of the country.

The flag of Mexico. The capital of Mexico is Mexico City. It is a tricolour design of green, white, and red, with the national coat of arms in the centre.
