How significant is it that Mary was Jesus' mother?

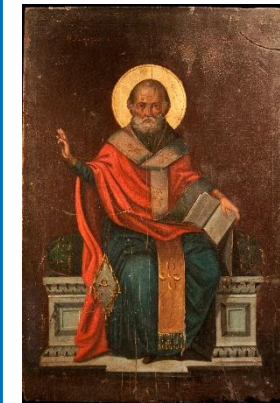
Key Vocabulary	Definition

Who was Mary?:



Mary was a young Jewish woman who lived in Nazareth and married a carpenter called Joseph. She was around 20 years old when she became the mother of Jesus, and it is thought that she was between 46 and 49 years old when Jesus died.

The origin of Father Christmas



St Nicholas was the Archbishop of Turkey in the 4th Century. He is the patron saint of children because it is said he performed miracles and brought children back from death. St Nicholas also gave out presents to children, so this is where our Father Christmas came from.

Why is Mary important to Christians?

Mary is important to Christians because she was chosen to be the mother of their saviour, Jesus Christ. Mary was not a noble woman or a famous woman. She was a young lady who lived a good life. The Roman Catholic faith call her Saint Mary, the Mother of the Church. They believe that because she is the mother of Jesus, who is the head of the Church, then she must be its mother, too.
