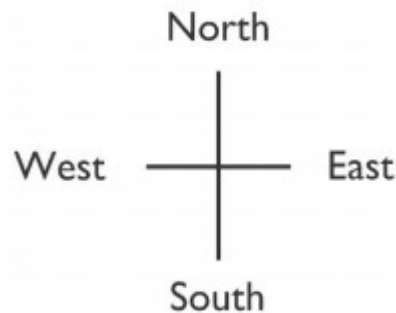
**Continents** There are 7 continents:

Atlas	A book containing different maps
Continent	A large area made up of different countries. The area is usually a large expanse of land but can be formed of many island countries.
Country	A nation with its own government
Culture	The ideas, customs and social behaviour of a group of particular people
Map	A diagram representing an area of land or sea showing physical features such as cities, and roads
Ocean	An expanse of salt water deeper and covering a larger area than a sea

**Continents**

**Europe**

- In France the food is rich in flavour and has strong smells as well as their specialised patisserie goods (e.g. French Onion soup, variety of cheese like brie, camembert etc)
- Italian food is all about combinations of delicious local flavours. This is seen particularly in pasta and pizza.

**Asia**

- Festival in China that starts off their new year and is also called the Spring Festival (Chinese New Year). The dragon represents strength, power and good luck.

**Oceania**

- Boomerangs are a core part of aboriginal culture for hunting purposes. Contrastingly, boomerangs are still popular but for entertainment.



**Africa and Antarctica**

- The equator is the central line across the earth that impacts our weather patterns. The closer a country is to the equator the hotter it will be and the further away a country is the colder it is (e.g. Kenya is very hot whereas Antarctica is very cold).

**South America**

- Carnival of Brazil marks the beginning of Lent in the Christian religion and is held the Friday afternoon to the afternoon of Ash Wednesday. Music, costumes and bright colours are a staple of the festival.

**North America**

- The Statue of Liberty was a gift from France in 1886. The statue represents the ideal of independence (America's independence from Britain) and its friendship with France.
- The spikes of the statue represent the 7 continents of the world. It is made out of copper and the torch is made out of gold.



**Oceans**

70% of the world is covered in water.

With the acronym PAIAS you can order the oceans from biggest to smallest.

**Pacific Ocean**

- This is the largest ocean meeting the US, Oceania and Asia.
- Pacific Ocean means peaceful ocean.

**Atlantic Ocean**

- This is the second biggest ocean and is half the size of the Pacific.
- The Titanic sank in the Atlantic Ocean in 1912.

**Indian Ocean**

- This is located between Africa and Austral-Asia.
- Largest breeding ground for the Humpback Whale.



**Arctic Ocean**

- This ocean is located around the North Pole and across the Arctic Circle. There are many polar bears living on the arctic ice.



**Southern Ocean**

- It is the home to Emperor Penguins and Wandering Albatrosses.
