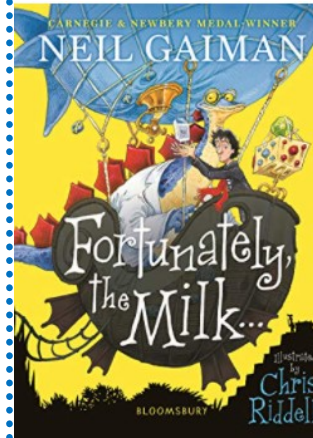

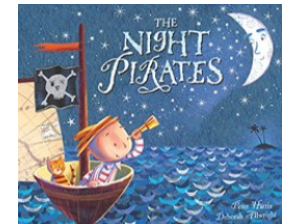
Summer 1— Fortunately, the milk

CHECK— Does it make sense and are the spellings correct?

CHOOSE - something to improve. Can we add and adjective or an adverb?

CHANGE—Make changes to correct (sense and spellings) or improve it.
