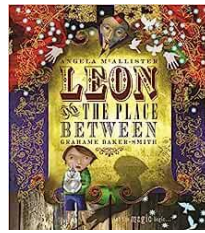

Key Vocabulary	Definition
Coordinating conjunction	FANBOYS- For, and, not, but, or, yet, so
Prefix	A letter or group of letters, for example, 'un-' that is added to the beginning of a word in order to form a different word. For example, the prefix 'un-' is added to 'happy' to form 'unhappy.'
Subordinating conjunction	ISAWAWABUB- If, since, as, when, although, while, after, before, until, because
Suffix	A letter or group of letters, for example, 'less-' that is added to the beginning of a word in order to form a different word. For example, the suffix 'less' is added to 'hope' to form 'hopeless.'

Beckoned	Verb. To summon someone or get their attention, by gesture or noise.
Believe	Verb. Accept that something is true without proof.
Lanterns	Noun. A lamp without a see-through case protecting the flame, typically with a handle that can be carried.
Lurched	Verb. Make an uncontrolled movement or number of uncontrolled movements
Magician	Noun. A person with magical powers
Tumbled	Verb. To fall quickly and without control
Volunteer	Verb. To freely offer to do something.

Elk	Noun. A moose
Invention	Noun. Something that has never been made before.
Mammoth	Noun. a large extinct elephant of the Pleistocene epoch, typically hairy with a sloping back and long curved tusks.
Parade	Noun. A parade is a group of people marching in ceremony, celebration, or protest

Noun	Adjective	Verb	Adverb
Person place or thing	Describes a noun	A doing word	Describes a verb (usually end in ly)
Boy, girl, tree, park, sister, shops, cat.	Beautiful, colossal, petite, delicate.	Swim, sprint, walk, clamber.	Quickly, carefully, cautiously, enthusiastically, boldly.

The petite boy danced passionately.

Conditional sentences

A conditional sentence refers to a possibility and an action such as:

- If I practice my letter formation, then my handwriting will get better.
- If it rains, then the picnic will be cancelled.

Adverbial phrase A phrase that acts like an adverb. It provides more information to the sentence.

We will escape in the morning
I swam very well.
I did my homework to make my teacher happy.

Expanded noun phrase- An expanded noun phrase provides more information about the noun phrase.

Noun phrase	Expanded noun phrase
The rabbit	The <u>white fluffy</u> rabbit
The ice cream	The <u>sweet, cold</u> ice cream

Apostrophes

An apostrophe for omission is used when other letters are no longer there.

I am – I'm
Do not- don't
Cannot- can't
Were not- weren't
Is not- isn't
Are not- aren't
We are- we're
They are- they're
You are- you're

Apostrophes

An apostrophe for possession is used to show that something belongs to someone. This can sometimes be tricky when it ends in an s.

Singular noun Sarah's	Singular noun s James'
Plural noun Women's	Plural noun s Parents'
2+ people Kim and Adams'	2+ people Kim's and Adam's
