Noun phrases

The use of an adjective before the noun to as more detail.

Adjectives			
furry	rough	dangerous	webbed
feathered	smooth	bulky	timid
scaly	lumpy	wide	bold

Example:

If it has *webbed feet*, it might be a bird.

Key Vocabulary	Definition
Adjective	A word that describes the noun.
Destruction	To break something down.
Dodo	An extinct species of bird.
Endangered	To be in danger of becoming extinct.
Extinct	There are no more left of something that is living.
Natural	Existing or derived in nature; not made or caused by humankind.
Noun	The name of a person, place or thing.
Oil	A liquid derived from petroleum.
Suffix	A letter or group of letters that, when added to the end of a word, changes the meaning.
Verb	What the noun is doing.
Imperative verb	A verb that tells someone to do something.
Water pollution	The release of substances into groundwater, lakes, or streams that damages the water.

Question stems with the wh spelling pattern.



When to add s or -es to create a plural.

Add **es** if the word ends in:

S x ch or sh

E.g.:

Fox.....Foxes

Albatross.....Albatrosses

Shades of meaning Ordering adjectives from least to most according to their meaning.

nice
pretty
beautiful
stunning
delightful

Coordinating conjunctions

Words used to join two phrases or sentences of equal rank.

And, or, but

Subordinating conjunctions

A conjunction that introduces a subordinate clause; a clause that is not as important.

If, that, because

The four sentence types:

Question: Have you seen a creature like this?

Command: Help us now.

Statement: A creature with webbed feet and a sharp beak is on the loose.

Exclamation: What a danger this could pose!
