

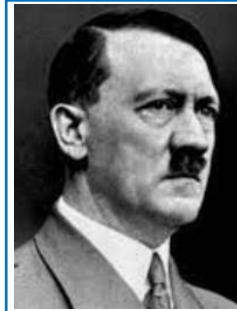

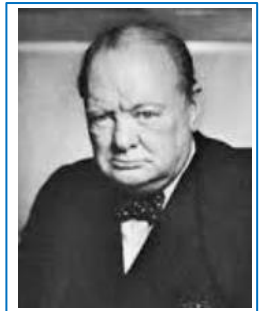
Important People

Prime Minister of Great Britain 1940-1945

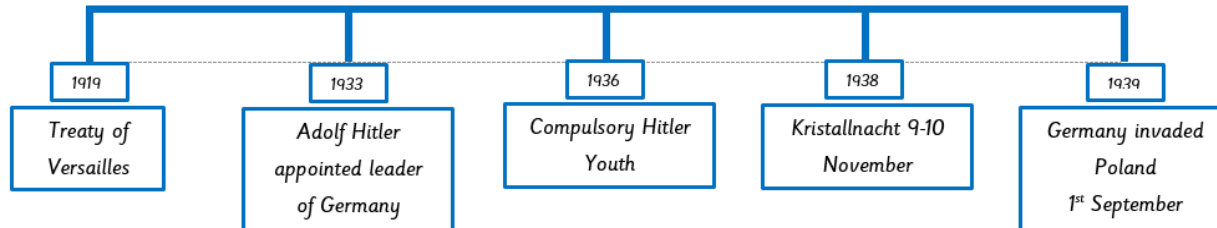
Key Vocabulary	Definition
armistice	An agreement made between opposing sides in a war to stop fighting.
Aryan race	A group of people the Nazis viewed to be superior than others (Aryan features included blue eyes and blond hair)
assassination	The murder of a person for political or religious reasons.
Blitzkrieg	A German word meaning "Lightning War": intensive or sudden military attacks.
coalition	A unity government formed with members of different political parties.
concentration camp	A place where people are imprisoned in harsh conditions without usual legal processes such as a trial.
intimidate	To frighten or threaten someone.
Jew	A person who is of Jewish heritage or who has converted to the Jewish religion.
Kristallnacht	Massive campaign of anti-Jewish violence.
nationalism	Support for a nation and its interests, often putting that nation above others.
persecute	To treat people cruelly or unfairly especially because of race or religious or political beliefs.
racism	When people are treated unfairly because of their skin colour or background.
refugee	A person who has been forced to leave their country, seeking refuge in order to escape war, persecution or natural disaster.
Treaty of Versailles	A document signed by Germany and the Allied Powers in 1919 to officially end WWI. It outlined punishments imposed upon Germany.

Concentration Camps

A concentration camp is a place where people are held as prisoners for political reasons. Unlike in actual prisons, the people are not there because they did anything wrong. Instead, they are members of a group that a government wishes to control or punish for some reason. The most well-known concentration camps were the ones used by Nazi Germany during World War II. The Germans set up the camps as part of their efforts to destroy the Jewish people of Europe. That effort was known as the Holocaust.
