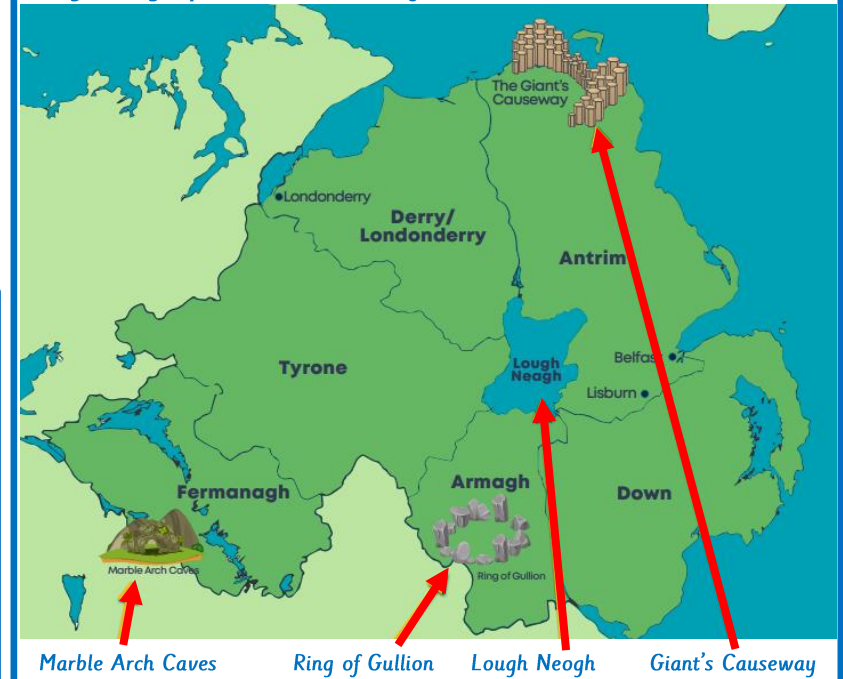

Key Geographical Features of Northern Ireland



Key Vocabulary	Definition
Belfast	Capital city of Northern Ireland

Northern Ireland

This is the smallest of the four parts of the United Kingdom. The other three parts are England, Scotland and Wales. Northern Ireland is often called Ulster because it includes six of the nine counties that made up the ancient kingdom of Ulster.



The Giant's Causeway

This is a rock formation, caused by a volcanic eruption. It is an area of about 40,000 interlocking basalt columns. The tops of the columns form stepping stones that lead from the cliff foot and disappear under the sea. Most of the columns are hexagonal and the tallest are about 12 metres high. There is a legend that it was created by a Giant called Finn MacCool who built it so he could go to fight a giant in Scotland.



The Marble Arch Caves

The Marble Arch Caves are a series of natural limestone caves in County Fermanagh. They are formed from three rivers draining off the northern slopes of the Cuilcagh mountain which combine underground to form the Cladagh. At 11.5 km long, it is the longest known cave system in Northern Ireland. In places it is 94 m deep.
