Noun:

The name of a person, place, or thing. A **proper noun** is a name used for an individual person, place, or organization, spelled with an initial capital letter.

- spoon Jayne
- pencil Oxford
- happiness Thursday

Verb:

What the noun is doing. Must be in the correct tense; present or past.

- Present Past
- Walk walked
- swim swam
- hammer hammered
- The continuous tense adds -ing to show the time passing.

| Key Vocabulary | Definition |

| <i>adjust</i> | To make something fit by moving or reshaping it slightly. |
| <i>dear</i> | To be regarded with deep affection or love. |
| <i>gratitude</i> | Being thankful, readiness to show appreciation for and to return kindness |
| <i>hammer</i> | Verb; to fit something together using an implement as a hammer (noun). |
| <i>propel</i> | To move something along; a force. |
| <i>prowl</i> | To move about restlessly and stealthily, especially in search of prey. |
| <i>rotate</i> | To move or cause to move in a circle round an axis or centre. |
| <i>sweet</i> | To be very cute or nice. |

Adjective:

Describes the noun. Used in the order; determiner, opinion, size, age, shape, colour, origin, material, purpose.

- A big, old cog.
- The crazy, blue wire.
- The new, square socket.

Adverb:

Describes the manner of the verb. Can be formed by adding the suffix -ly. Slowly, quickly, happily, frantically.

Super sentence

Rosie quickly poked the crazy, blue wire into the new hole.

Sequencing

Sequencing is putting things in the correct order. When reading you need to **remember** what has happened and the **order** that it has happened in. Sequencing is particularly important when writing instructions and retracing your steps.

Prediction

Prediction is not guessing! Prediction, when reading, involves **remembering** what has happened before and then using this information to say what will happen next. E.g. in the book Stuck, quite a long way in, the boy grabs a saw. Children who are predicting correctly will say that this will be thrown in the tree, because everything else has been so far. Children who are solely using **inference** (their own knowledge that saws cut down trees) will say he will cut the tree down.

Conjunctions:

Conjunctions link clauses or sentences together.

They can be:

- Co-ordinating: and, but, or,
- Subordinating: because, if, when
