

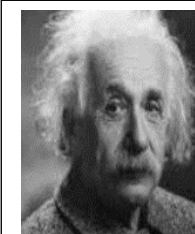

Key Vocabulary	Definition
admire	To respect or approve of someone or something
aspirational	A strong desire to do something
career	A long-term occupation or profession
core values	The principles that drive your life and shape who you are
discriminate	To make an unfair or unjust distinction in the treatment of different categories of people
employee	The person employed by the organisation to carry out work for them or on behalf of them
employer	A person or organisation that employs people
equality	The state of being equal, especially in status, rights and opportunities
inspirational	Being made to feel hopeful or encouraged
job	Something you do for money
payslip	A document issued by an employer stating how much the employee has earned
salary/wage	A fixed, regular payment made by an employer to an employee
skill	The ability to do something well
stereotype	A fixed, oversimplified belief about a person or group of people
transferable	A skill you can take from one job or career to another
unconscious bias	Discriminating and stereotyping without realising
unpaid	A job carried out without payment for the services done
volunteer	A person who offers freely to take part in an enterprise or task
work	An activity involving mental and/or physical effort done in order to achieve a purpose or result
workplace	A place, such as an office or factory, where people go to work

### Protected Characteristics.

These are important characteristics of people that cannot be unfairly used against them. If you feel you are being discriminated against because of one of these characteristics, it is important you talk to a trusted adult. Schools have a legal responsibility to promote equality and tackle discrimination based on the nine protected characteristics outlined in the 2010 Equality Act.



**Workplace stereotypes** are preconceived notions about individuals based on their protected characteristics such as disability, gender, age, ethnicity, and cultural background. These stereotypes can lead to unfair assumptions, biases, and discriminatory behaviours that negatively affect the targeted individuals' career opportunities and overall well-being.
